

MARK'S MESSAGE

Famous Last Words

Most people never get a chance to leave behind famous last words. It's difficult, after all, to script our own final dialogue. But there are exceptions.

Union General John Sedgwick was arranging his troops before the Battle of Spotsylvania in 1864. When his men warned him about Confederate snipers in the area he famously



Charles Gussman, the famous TV announcer for *Days of Our Lives*, took off his oxygen mask while lying on his hospital bed and said, "*And now for a final word from our sponsor.*" Malcom X shouted to a rowdy New York City auditorium, "*Brothers! Brothers, please! This is a house of peace!*" Then he fell to an assassin's bullets. And then there's Steve Jobs. According to his sister Mona, his final words were: "*Oh wow, oh wow, oh wow.*" We presume he was experiencing something even more paradigm-shifting than the debut of a new Apple product.

So what about the last words of Jesus? We know of at least seven statements that Jesus made from the cross. The most poignant and powerful is this one: "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?"

Tim Keller, the pastor of Redeemer Presbyterian Church in Manhattan, New York, points out that as Jesus is dying He doesn't scream, "My friends, my friends," or "My head, my head." Everyone present (with the probable exception of the Roman soldiers who crucified him), knew that "My God, my God" were the opening words of Psalm 22, where David the King agonizes in the pain of his suffering and loss. "My God" is the language of intimacy. Think of the way we might say, "That's my daughter Jenni," or "That's my son Brian."

Keller writes: "If after a service some Sunday morning one of the members of my church comes up to me and says, 'I never want to see you or talk to you again,' I will feel pretty bad. But if today my wife comes up to me and says, 'I never want to see you or talk to you again,' that's [overwhelmingly] worse. The longer the love, the deeper the love, the greater the torment of loss."

Think about the fact that "this forsakenness, this loss, was between the Father and the Son, who had loved each other from all eternity. This love was infinitely long, absolutely perfect, and Jesus was losing it... Jesus, the Maker of the world, was being unmade. Why? Jesus was experiencing our Judgment Day." A special word was even coined to express such pain. It is excruciating, which literally means "out of the cross."

A THOUGHT FROM KEITH

I Need To Hit The Refresh Button

"For the word of God is alive and active. Sharper than any double-edged sword, it penetrates even to dividing soul and spirit, joints and marrow; it judges the thoughts and attitudes of the heart." Hebrews 4:12 (NIV)

It never fails. The moment I sit down to work at my computer, I'm interrupted.

I tend to multi-task, so I can be trying to do 3 or 4 different things at one time. As a result, I often have multiple websites open. That's when the interruptions start.

I have to leave what I was doing and after quite a while I finally return to my computer. As it awakens I notice the opened websites look exactly the same as when I left them all that time ago. Untouched. Unchanged. Suspended in time. But as soon as I hit the refresh button, all the information on the untouched, unchanged, suspended-in-time pages turns instantly current. I feel that for many of us this is the way we feel at different times of our lives. We need refreshed, we need to refocus and we need to take a look at what our priorities are and where God fits in to them. A similar thing happens when we leave our Bibles untouched and then begin reading again. As we read in today's key verse, God's Word is "alive and active." Reading it refreshes our souls and can touch and change our lives.

Recently while I was reading Psalm 23, King David's words became alive and active. It felt like God hit the refresh button in my spirit to show me the current application of this familiar Psalm. Can I share with you how I was refreshed by these six short verses? "The LORD is my shepherd; I have all that I need. He lets me rest in green meadows; he leads me beside peaceful streams. He renews my strength. He guides me along right paths, bringing honor to his name. Even when I walk through the darkest valley, I will not be afraid, for you are close beside me. Your rod and your staff protect and comfort me. You prepare a feast for me in the presence of my enemies. You honor me by anointing my head with oil. My cup overflows with blessings. Surely your goodness and unfailing love will pursue me all the days of my life, and I will live in the house of the LORD forever." (NLT)

Refreshed, these ancient words reminded me: He gives me all I need. (v1): He lets me rest. (v2): He leads me. (v2): He renews me. (v3): He guides me. (v3): He keeps me company. (v4): He protects me. (v4): He raises me up. (v5): He honors me. (v5): He pursues me. (v6): He will spend eternity with me. (v6) Do you need refreshed? This Spring Break, take the time to rest, recharge the batteries and draw close to God. I know I need to do so. God's Word has power. Each time we read it, words penned thousands of years ago come to life over and over again! His Word is truly alive and active. God longs to touch and change our lives each day with His power. I just love God's Word! And I pray if you don't already, some day you will, too.

CARE PORTAL

In the last week we have had two Care Portal cases we were able to answer. I wrote about them in an email to Portal Presbys last Friday night but want to fill in the end of the stories for all FPC members. After searching out the location of a tiny apartment inside a large metal building several miles out of town, Ed and I were able to deliver a set of bunk beds, bedding and a set of cookware to a single mom with children, 10 and 12 years of age. The new mattresses were delivered the same afternoon. The mom was thrilled that the kids would no longer be sleeping on the floor. When I visited with her the next day, she reported that along with the new beds, she was surprised the kids were almost as excited about seeing the new red pots and pans. After dinner they told her, "Mom, this is the first REAL meal we've had since we moved in!" I can truly say that this was one of the most rewarding cases we've experienced as the mom was so grateful and proclaimed, "God has been good to us." Her faith in the Lord was very real.

Then the other case was the single father needing a pull-behind baby carrier for his 5-month old son. Within an hour of my email, I received a call from one of our newer younger members who had found one available at the WalMart in McPherson and wanted to purchase it. We made a quick trip up there and also were able to add an infant safety helmet and flag. The father has been working hard to ensure the baby won't be put into foster care and the caseworker is pleased with the advancements he is making in efforts at beginning a new life.

We delivered the items to the St. Francis social worker who will get them on to the father. I'm sure whenever we see a father with an old bike pulling a new cart with a small baby, we'll wonder if that's the Care Portal dad.

Thanks to all of you who include this worthwhile outreach in your FPC donations. It may be one or two small steps at a time, but we are helping to make a difference in the lives of some of the less fortunate people in Reno County. I have to agree with the mom in the first case, "God has been good to us!" — Marj Johnson

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FAURÉ'S "REQUIEM"

Special Music in Worship Sunday, April 2, 10:30 a.m. Service FPC Chancel Choir presents Fauré's Requiem

"People have said my Requiem did not express the terror of death; someone called it a 'lullaby of death.' But that's the way I perceive death: As a happy release and aspiration to the happiness of beyond, rather than a grievous passage."— Gabriel Fauré (1845-1924)

French composer, organist, and choirmaster Gabriel Fauré was a student of Camille Saint-Saëns, and later a teacher to Ravel. He was a song composer of major importance; Fauré's *Requiem* remains a standard in choral repertoire, with its setting of funeral rites rather than the full traditional Requiem Mass.
