PASTOR'S MESSAGE

As you might have noticed by now, I love love love Lent. I actually love Easter – it's my favorite holiday – so it stands to reason that I love Lent, the time between Ash Wednesday and Easter.

Lent is often overlooked in Protestant churches, which have historically considered it a Catholic holiday. I think that's a huge mistake. Lent is a time in which we



remember the 40 days Jesus spent in the wilderness being tempted by Satan, the time between his baptism by John the Baptizer and the beginning of his public ministry.

We tend to think of Lent as a time when we give something up. "I gave that up for Lent" is a common refrain, and something we kind of like to say because, if we're being honest, it makes us sound and feel virtuous. The idea is that we give up something we really like for those 40 days as a sign of sacrifice and to test our self-discipline, reminiscent of Jesus' sacrifice in the wilderness.

I used to give something up for Lent every year. I'd give up chocolate, or Dr. Pepper, or gossiping with my friends. One particularly harrowing Lent when I was 15, I gave up Tiger Beat magazine. But I was always eager for Lent to be over so I could jump right back to whatever it was I'd given up. I never thought about whether I could actually do without whatever it was for longer than the 40 days, or maybe forever. Instead, I counted down the days like I was waiting for the end of a prison term.

The day I realized that's what I was doing is the day I stopped giving things up for Lent. Instead, I now treat Lent as a time to get even closer to Jesus. To read the scriptures about his journey to the cross again, to try to see them in a new way, to try to find even more ways to shine his light in an ever-darkening world. And while I sure don't judge anyone who still practices giving something up for Lent, I've brought my enthusiasm for new Lent practices to FPC Hutchinson, and for the past two years, we've explored these 40 sacred days together, starting with Ash Wednesday and continuing through the joyous celebration of Easter.

We have some new plans for Lent this year, and some familiar rituals as well. You'll be getting more information about all of it in the next couple of weeks. I hope you're as excited about it as I am.

The longer that I have Christ the more I realize that no matter how all over the place you are in your life, your purpose that God created you for, is still your purpose. I have been there and got the t-shirt when it comes to being all over the place but the wonderful thing is that as Christians, God's handywork is perfect and the things God has prepared for us to do is still the same. So even if you have been totally missing the mark, just know, God hits a moving target! That always gave me such hope! Often, God will step in and disrupt our best laid plans. Look at Paul and his Damascus Road experience. His plans changed in an instance after his encounter with God. Suddenly he was being told to get up and go to Damascus and there you will be told everything that you have been assigned to do. What you have to realize is that it wasn't until Paul obeyed God's first set of instructions that he got to the next point of his transformational story. The question that we need to ask sometimes is, do we stay stuck longer in a place because we haven't followed God's instructions when He says, get up and go?

I believe that Paul's whole encounter with Jesus can be summed up with "GET UP AND GO." I came to realize that like Paul, there was only one question to ask: "What should I do Lord?" The Lord repeated the message of "GO" and that's what he did. He knew the danger he would face but he trusted God and he went. As he spoke to the crowd a mob got mad and wanted to kill him. I think if I was in Paul's shoes I would have taken off as fast as I could but he stood his ground. I find it interesting that Paul let them know he was a Roman citizen and it wasn't legal for them to be attacking him. Paul was like, look nah, I was born a Roman citizen and y'all are out of line trying to do this.

Now I have to say that Paul wasn't afraid to be beaten for Christ, but he also wasn't afraid to exercise his legal rights to escape illegitimate punishment and take his case and message to a higher authority. Paul didn't know what was going to happen next, he just knew that he had to be obedient. Paul had to follow the first set of instructions before he could get the next set of instructions. A lot of us want to know God's purpose for our lives, but we missing it because we haven't done what He first told us to do. My friends, I want to encourage you to follow God in faith throughout 2024. Hear from Him and go do what He is asking you to do. Then get ready to hear the next part of the journey.

When we show God how serious we are about pursuing Him, then He can begin to guide us, direct us, and order our steps. But we must do the two-step first. When Paul asked, "What should I do Lord?" The Lord answered him with specific instructions. So, we know that the instructions God gave you to do are specific. Do them in faith. Be serious about your faith walk. Stop letting the world make you think you can dip in and out of obedience to God. We can be like Paul, someone who had a pretty rough past, who was moving all around persecuting Jesus and anyone who believed in Jesus. But God hit that moving target on a road to Damascus. And God used Paul in a mighty way to save people. The question is; "Are you being Saul or Paul in your life right now?" Follow the two steps so that you can be used by God in a powerful way.
