PASTOR'S MESSAGE

"Then the disciples were glad when they saw the Lord. Jesus said to them again, 'Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, even so I am sending you. And when he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you withhold forgiveness from any, it is withheld.""

~ John 20:20-23



Easter has now come and gone. Regardless of the frequency of your church attendance, I'd guess that you and most people you know attended an Easter service somewhere. And what a refreshing service Easter Sunday is! We get to sing hymns that are only sung on that specific Sunday, some come in their Sunday best, maybe you get to have a fancy Easter meal with family, and we get to celebrate the reality that Jesus Christ is risen! We get to rejoice and exclaim "He is risen indeed! Hallelujah!"

We are all refreshed, perhaps revived with a new spirit and fervor... until the meal is over and we have to clean up. Or until Monday or Tuesday morning comes around and we have to go back to work. Where did all that joy and gusto of Easter morning go?

Like the disciples, we were glad when we saw the Lord. And you heard these words in the Easter service (and every service), "Peace be with you." Even in our gladness, Jesus still comes to us and says the same thing as when we are afraid.

The reality is that even though we have that gladness on Easter morning, all too quickly the minutiae of the daily grind sets back in. This is not unique to us and our time. As the disciples were glad and rejoicing that Jesus had returned, Jesus gives them His peace, and in the same breath sends them out. "As the Father has sent me, even so I am sending you."

So what does it look like post-Easter for us? Is it just a morning celebration? A time to hide Easter eggs, eat too much candy, and then get back to daily living? Or has Jesus tasked us with a new duty in which to serve God and the world?

If that last question scares you, let me counter it with this: Peace be with you!

Post-resurrection, we are now all called to go out into the world as God sent the Son, this is true. But Jesus doesn't hang his disciples out to dry, nor does he do that to us, as his disciples now. Instead, in the wake of Easter, he breathed on them the Holy Spirit. It is this same Spirit that breathes new life into each of us.

Jesus doesn't wait for the disciples to peek out of the locked room. He doesn't wait for us to muster up the confidence to step out into the world. He tells us to be at peace, and then breathes his word of forgiveness on us.

It is in that Word that we go out into the world! It is in that Word that we trust and faith is created. In that Word we have full confidence that as Jesus has taken our sins with him to the grave and has risen, we too are given new life! Life to live at peace in the name of Jesus now and forever.

I wonder have you taken the time to reflect on how important and special Easter is? When I think of Easter on elf the first words that springs into my mind is "HOPE." Jesus brings hope to hopeless world. Without Easter Sunday and our "Risen Lord" life would be pointless. If God wasn't actually there then all that is left is utter hopelessness. We should never want to put our hope in Jesus simply because it makes us feel better. We should only put our hope in Jesus because there are good reasons to believe Christianity is true. The truth test for Christianity is the resurrection. Unfortunately, to many people have loss hope and have got the wrong idea of what it means to follow Jesus. They stop believing in Jesus because they haven't experienced a certain answer to prayer, they haven't experienced God in the way they'd like or any number of other reasons that have nothing to do with whether Christianity is true.

The apostle Paul gives us the actual truth test for Christianity in 1 Corinthians 15:14: "If Christ has not been raised, then our preaching is in vain and your faith is in vain." If Jesus wasn't raised from the dead, we can pack our Christian bags and go home. There is much evidence for the resurrection and the evidence should be found in our lives. Because Jesus was raised from the dead, we have a hope that should change how we live our lives. His resurrection confirms we can trust in his promises of eternal life—an eternal life where every tear will be wiped away, and suffering and death will be no more Rev. 21:4.

That's a hope worth hungering and longing for. That's a hope that should change how we see everything in this life. The greatest gift of Easter is a certain hope of eternity with Jesus. It's a gift that should wet our appetites to hunger after Jesus for the rest of our lives.

EARTH MATTERS

As we celebrate Earth Week 2024, let's learn and teach reverence for the miraculous planet we have been given and preserve it for those that follow us. Help recycle electronic waste (e-waste) and prevent it going to the landfill. Bring your old, worn-out electronics to the church starting April 14. All will be collected by Sunday, April 28. Collection boxes will be at both the east and south doors. All e-Waste will go to Sanford's Computer Works, 20 S. Main to be taken apart, recycled, and reused.



E-waste (<u>anything with a plug</u>) is currently the fastest growing solid waste stream in the world, outpacing plastic. In 2019, 53.6 million TONS of e-waste was produced, while documentation showed that only 17.4% of that was recycled. Lead, a toxic substance, leaches into the soil when e-waste is thrown into the trash or is released into the air with open burning.

Sanford's will receive all e-waste items with the exception of old-style cathode TVs. Examples of e-waste are cell phones, I-pads, computers, printers, calculators, VCRs, copiers, fax machines, power activated tools with batteries (building and garden), stereos, DVD and video game players, flat screen TVs, microwaves. EARTH MATTERS appreciates larger items taken to Sanford's individually and not collected at the church.
